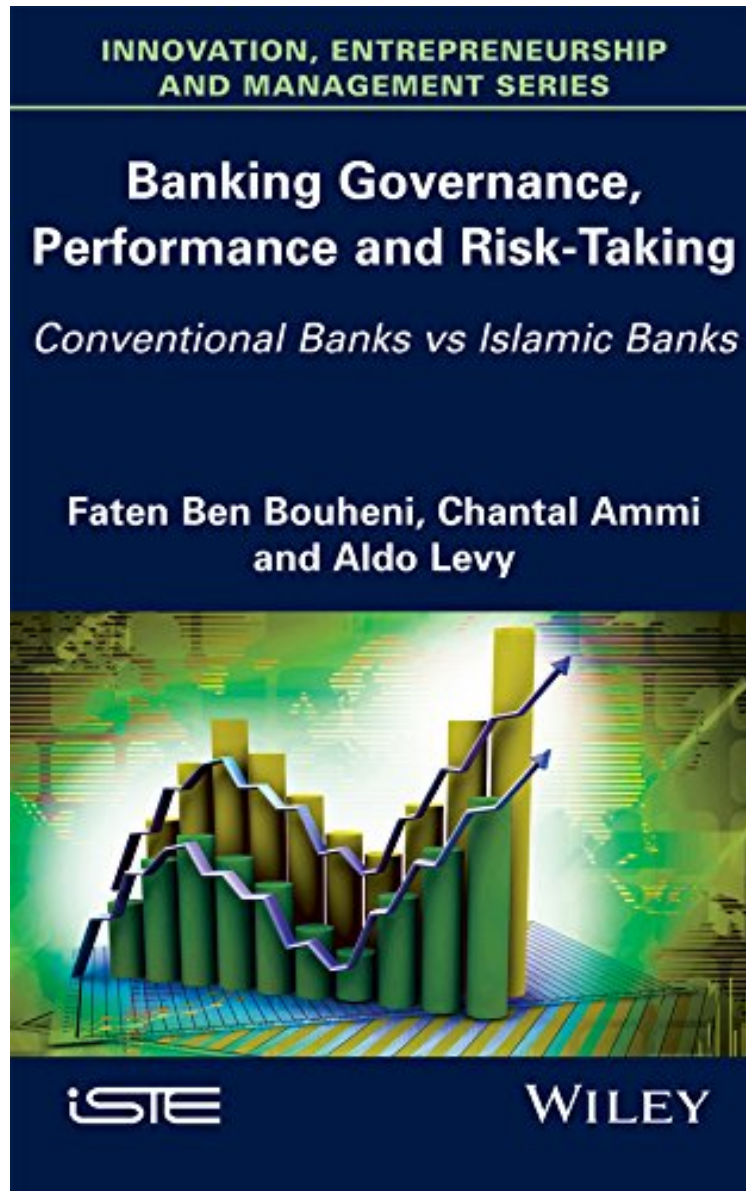


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Banking Governance, Performance and Risk-Taking: Conventional Banks vs Islamic Banks (Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Management)
